INTELLIGENCE

The theme for our recent Neighbourhood Watch (NW) Conference was the collection and dissemination of information. The process by which information becomes useful intelligence is through the three stages of collection, collation and dissemination. Collation, the process of bringing information together to make intelligence, is what the police do extremely well. However without the raw information they don't have much to work on. Therefore what we must do is to provide as much of the raw information as possible and that means keeping our wits about us, so that we observe and report ANYTHING suspicious. That way together we will have the best chance of reducing crime.

The Easter hols are now but a distant memory and it's back to the grindstone for most of us. The criminal fraternity are also looking to step up their activities in preparation for their summer hols so now is the time to be ever watchful for suspicious activities. Police Direct reported just such a case recently when burglars were caught in the act after someone phoned in to report what they thought was suspicious. More successes like that and there's a chance we'll persuade them to hunt elsewhere.

If something appears to be odd, out of place or suspicious then report it to the police on either 999 or 01284 774100; and do it at once.

Well the summer is around the corner, possibly for a few days at least and whilst this gives us all the opportunity to take leisurely walks in the beautiful countryside in our part of Suffolk, it also gives the light fingered few an opportunity to steal prized possessions left on display in vehicles parked at the country parks in our area. Ideally I would ask that valuables are not left in vehicles, but if there is no alternative please make sure that they are hidden in the boot. As part of a continuing campaign to restrict opportunities for vehicle crime all local officers have spotter pads, not the ABC kind those of you who have ever had any interest in railways will know what I mean, to record vehicle details where property is on display or the vehicle is insecure. The pads are then submitted to our Community Safety Unit who will generate a letter to act as a gentle reminder to the owner of the vehicle.

So remember a few seconds removing or hiding property or locking a vehicle could prevent a serious financial loss and inconvenience to the owner.

Before I close I would like to thank Peter for his continued contribution to the Watch News and know that he is still busy preparing articles from the confines of the West Suffolk Hospital. He is to all of us within Bury Rural a superb example of what can be achieved in the face of adversity and whilst he is a hard act to follow would echo his sentiment that we need an editor to help us in the fight against crime. I'm not so sure what he means by police speak though!

What, you may be asking has all this got to do with NW and Peter's Panel? - I can't think! Except that we need a new editor/author for the Bury Rural Watch News and someone to jolly along Neighbourhood Watches in Rural. Essentially the latter has to be someone with much experience of running a Watch who has the confidence of other NW Co-ordinators.

Editing the Watch News principally involves translating "police speak" and "police report" into clear simple English that is more akin to newspaper rather that police reportage. It is NOT always that simple. You must, obviously, be computer literate and it makes life much simpler to work on both a home computer and the police network in either Ixworth or Horringer Police Stations.
