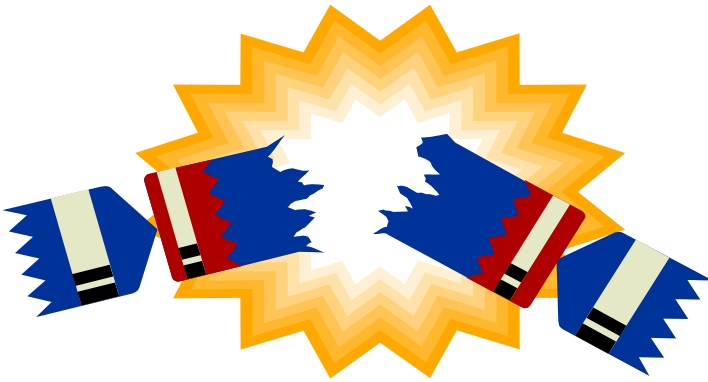

The Orchestra of All Souls Langham Place. St Peter's Church, Hepworth.

Sometimes when scurrying through our lives we chance upon an event which causes us to stop and take note. So it was on the balmy afternoon of Sunday 8th October when a pleasingly large congregation forsook the blue skies & golden sunshine for the radiance within St Peter's Church Hepworth. All through the body of the Church, the pews were filled with people, glorious tributes of flowers stood around the pulpit and lectern, a gala atmosphere reminiscent of the magnificent Harvest Festivals of yesteryear prevailed.

Bang on Two -Thirty, Mr. Reg. Taylor introduced the Orchestra and we were away. Within the first few bars of the opening piece, we all knew that we were in for a cultural treat. "*Amparito Roca*," played with all the pazz & brio that a work of this nature needs, got our feet tapping and set the standard for the rest of the afternoon.

Noel Tredinnick engaged with his audience at the earliest opportunity, welcoming us to an afternoon of music, performed, "before your very eyes." As with the character who first coined this phrase, our champion was a skilful raconteur who interspersed the music with an amusing array of anecdotes & asides. Two delicious confections later, having whetted our appetites he revealed his plans for more substantial fare, pointing out that all the Hymns chosen were user-friendly favourites that we had all known since childhood. Well here was a congregation intent on enjoying itself even further, everybody sang LOUDLY, producing a volume of sound that St. Peter's had not enjoyed for many a long year. From there on things rocketed along, all too quickly came the interval after a final jubilant rendition of the *Alleluia* chorus performed by the lovely young soprano Heidi Pegler.

There is a fine tradition that the Ladies of the Parish like to preserve on these occasions, and this one was no different, a sumptuous spread of the most appetising refreshments awaited our approval. I only hope we did them justice. Well done Ladies!

Resuming after the break the Maestro returned to his task with a driven enthusiasm, fervently quoting from the scriptures between items, reminding us that the music was merely an adjunct complimentary to praising God. Our sentiments being entirely in compliance with his, even stretched to the point where we all sang a brand new hymn before concluding with the much loved *How Great Thou Art*.

Suddenly it was all over and in the afterglow we were perhaps left wondering which had been the most enjoyable piece. Was it perhaps *Meditation by Massenet*, the *Alleluia by Mozart* or the *Theme from "Shindler's List" by John Williams*, or there again something completely different? As we rose from our seats came the feeling that we had just experienced a life-enhancing therapy and that here on this memorable occasion Our Lord had been an ENGLISHMAN spending the afternoon in St Peter's Hepworth.

Our thanks go firstly to Reg Taylor for all his hard work and **generosity**, to Noel Tredinnick and the Members of All Souls Orchestra for coming all the way from London, and last but not least to everybody else who helped stage this most memorable concert.

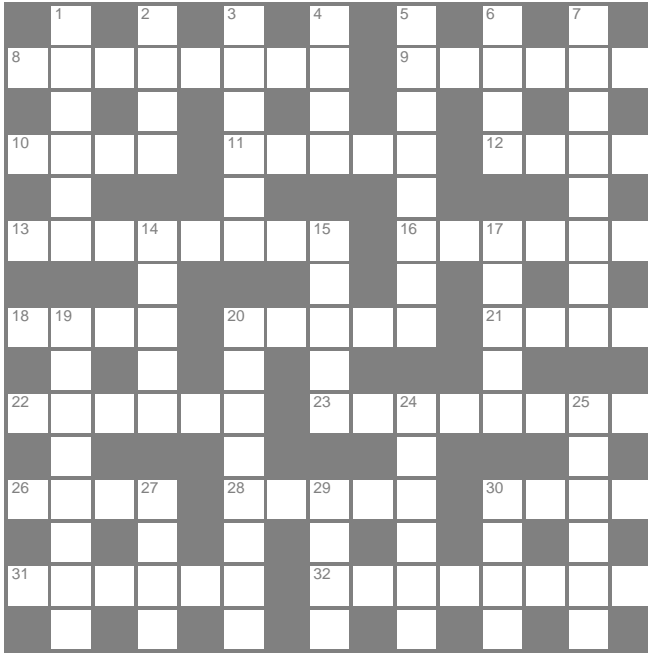

CRIME UPDATES

Barningham. On Hepworth Road four straw bales were set on fire around 9pm on 22 Oct.

Stanton. Between 2 and 6 Nov two sheds on Glassfield Road were forced open. A rotovator was stolen from one and garden tools from the other.

Overnight 5/6 Oct three people were filmed moving heating oil out of a tank into a plastic container on Shepherds Grove Industrial Estate. One then spotted the CCTV, and they all fled leaving the oil behind.

The same night a CD player was taken from the unlocked boot of a vehicle parked in the same area.

A bench was damaged and dragged to the Community Centre on Old Bury Road at 7.45pm on 24 Oct.

Three males were recorded on CCTV stealing a skip lorry from a building in Shepherds Grove at 2.15am on 25 Oct.

Overnight 27/28 Oct a piece of plastic pipe was used to break a window of the Community Centre on Old Bury Road.

Thelnetham. A blue Suzuki motor bike was stolen from the back of a house on Hopton Road early on 11 Oct

The phone box on Hopton Road was broken into at 11pm 16 Oct.

POLICE DIRECT:

In spite of new legislation totally banning hare coursing and hunting with dogs, illegal hare coursing still continues in the rural areas of Suffolk. The majority of offenders are usually from London and the Home Counties. Farmers and gamekeepers are well aware of the problem and seek assistance from the public to help the police and themselves detect and prosecute those persons responsible. An incident occurred on 24th October in Pakenham and police are dealing with the offender. On this occasion the offender was using a white Ford transit van, registration mark L 661 DLJ. If you have any information about this incident the police would like to hear from you on 01284 774100. If you observe this vehicle or believe that persons are engaging or about to engage in hare coursing, please contact the police using the 999 system. This message is being broadcast county wide, as historically this has been a widespread problem.

Have you 'ICE'd' your mobile phone yet?

Just to remind you that East Anglian Ambulance Service have launched a national 'In case of Emergency (ICE)' campaign with the support of Falklands war hero Simon Weston and in association with Vodafone's annual life savers award.

The idea is that you store the word "ICE" in your mobile phone address book, and against it enter the number of the person you would want to be contacted "In Case of Emergency".

In an emergency situation ambulance and hospital staff will then be able to quickly find out who your next of kin are and be able to contact them.

It's so simple - everyone can do it. Please do. Please will you also forward this to everybody in your address book, it won't take too many forwards before everybody will know about this

CRIMINAL DAMAGE? PLEASE REPORT IT!!

Due to more people reporting cases of criminal damage to property and cars – Suffolk Constabulary has been given funding for a Criminal Damage Team (CDT).

THE ONLY WAY THEY CAN WORK EFFICIENTLY IS BY RECEIVING INFORMATION FROM YOU.

They can then hot spot areas of concern and have access to an overt deployable camera, currently situated in St. Andrews St. North in Bury Town. Each time the camera is deployed a substantial reduction in crime is seen, even a complete cessation in some areas.

The public are asked to report all offences even minor ones, and offenders are encouraged to “clean the slate” so help document the incidences. Hotspot areas for car crime are all late night routes home from the town centre. Where the street lighting is poor, a camera cannot be deployed but late night patrols are aware and have increased in these particular areas. Criminal damage reports have increased by 20% and the detection rates by 26% (over target).

So – please report any cases – either call 999 if an offence is happening at the time or 01284 744100 after the event.
