

WARNING ON FRAUD - COUNTYWIDE

Police are again urging anyone considering buying a dog via the internet to be alert after further reports of a scam designed to get money under false pretences were received by officers.

Suffolk Police issued a warning earlier this month after a Rendlesham resident spotted an advert on the internet for a Siberian husky puppy saying all that would be needed to buy the puppy was the cost of transportation - several hundred pounds.

The buyer was told there was a shipping company involved and was asked to pay half of the cost. She was then asked for more money as refundable insurance. In total £350 was sent off to an address in Africa.

The buyer was then told that the dog was stuck at a UK airport and that further cash would be needed for permits - and again several hundred pounds was requested. The buyer then contacted the airport and was told there were no dogs awaiting shipment.

At this point it was realised this was a scam and no further money was handed over.

Police have received several reports of residents in Ipswich, Stowmarket, Felixstowe and Bury St Edmunds being conned in a similar way in recent weeks - with a variety of different dogs, usually puppies, including King Charles Spaniels, Pugs and English Bulldogs, being used to entice buyers.

Police are urging anyone considering buying a dog off the internet to be cautious and not to send money if there are any doubts the seller may not be genuine. In many of these cases the buyers have transferred money to banks or addresses in Africa - despite the seller often giving a story that they are UK based.

As with any transaction it is always wise to speak to local sellers/ tradesmen to get quotes or view items before agreeing to purchase as many reputable companies/ dealers will be covered by other guarantees and trade association good practice. **Estate** It was agreed to objection to County Mulch's application to the Environment Agency to vary their permit because a) County Mulch wished to increase the tonnage threefold, despite being unable to cope with tonnage handled at present; b) they had not complied with their undertaking to reduce or eliminate the smells over the last few months despite colder weather; and c) the request to increase the range of materials to be processed to include those unsuitable for consumption or processing was unacceptable especially because of points a) and b).

<u>Clerk's Report</u> The report included postponement of a planned training session, the appointment of a new Parish Clerk with handover in late-January, the availability of the mobile grocery delivery services in the village on Tuesdays, the street lamp obscured by a tree near the Old School, the provision of two additional dog litter bins, the need for a bus timetable on the notice board, and overhanging trees in North Common.

Any Other Business The Clerk will report the broken street-lamp at the junction of North Common and The Street; will arrange for an appeal to be inserted in the newsletter for a NW co-ordinator in Beck Street; will seek tenders for minor works to Willow Green bus shelter; and will ask for safety improvements to the ditch by the pumping station n Willlow Green.

<u>Date of Next Meetings</u> The next meetings will be Parish Action Planning on 4th February and Parish Council meeting on 4th March, both at 7.30 pm in the Pavilion.

HEPWORTH PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting of the Parish Council took place on Thursday, 7th January 2010 at the pavilion. The meeting was chaired by Mr Stannard. Amongst the matters discussed were:

Report from County Councillor The report covered actions being undertaken by Suffolk CC Highways Department during the cold weather.

Report from Borough Councillor The report covered the cancellation of the Police Safer Neighbourhood Team meeting, the new Community Cohesion and Partnership Board which is offering funding; grants available for community group events over Suffolk Open Weekend (23rd-25th July) for sporting events linked to the Olympics; and Planning Aid, a free and independent planning advice service offered nationwide to those who cannot afford to pay professional fees to submit or oppose planning applications.

Report from Police Community Support Officer There were two reported crimes since 6th November: the theft of 20 m of blackthorn and native hedging from farmland near Goswell Farm, Clay Lane around 24th December; and the theft of a locked, secure horse trailer containing horse equipment from a field by North Farm Cottage, Market Weston Road on 3rd January. Information was also provided about messages and information from the Suffolk Resilience Forum which includes members of SCC, the Police, and local councils.

<u>Accounts for Payment</u> Payments were agreed for the clerk's salary and expenses and for the external auditor's fee for the 2008-09 accounts.

Finance The external auditor's report for the 2008-09 accounts was noted, and the annual return was approved and accepted by the Parish Council. It was noted that further actions were required in connection with adopting a safe code of practice for risk assessment and accident investigation, reviewing the effectiveness of the internal audit, and assessing the level of fidelity guarantee held.

CREDIT CARD SCAMS RE REFUND ON YOUR CARD IS BACK

Members of Mid Suffolk South, have kindly been telling me about a credit card scam, many thanks for letting me know, but I am afraid as ever this particular scam in question is yet another that has been doing the rounds for some considerable period of time now and just keeps popping back up from time to time.

This is a scam where a caller pretends to state they are either from Mastercard or Visa's security & Fraud Department, informing you that your account/card has been flagged with regard to an unusual purchase.

They could ask you if you have recently ordered anything for a strange amount, the favourite being an Anti-Telemarketing Device for £497.99 from a Marketing company based in London?" When the person says NO, the caller then offers to credit their account, provided you confirm you are the card holder by giving them your security code, which comprises 3 numbers to the right of the signature strip.

These callers have even given reference numbers and quoted telephone and account numbers.

A genuine representative would never ask you for these 3 security numbers, so never give this information out to a cold caller

if you doubt a caller is genuine, for anything, even if they say they are with the police, then ask them for a main switchboard number and their direct dial details, then check your bank statement/ local directory or other main source, to see if the numbers are similar. Phone the number and ask for verification that the person to check whether or not they are bona fide.

Or if it's a bank tell them to put it in writing or ask if you can deal with it through your local branch.

DRINK DRIVING - CHRISTMAS CAMPAIGN

This Christmas Suffolk has seen a reduction in the percentage of people recorded risking their lives and the lives of others by drink driving.

The results of Suffolk Police's Christmas drink-drive campaign for 2009 shows a decrease of 1.3% when compared to the figures from the same campaign in 2008.

The month-long campaign began on 1st December 2009 and saw officers countywide conduct 1416 breath tests. Of those tests 95 were positive (6.7 per cent), averaging 3 motorists caught every day during the campaign.

This compares to December 2008 when 8 per cent of those breath tested were positive.

4.4% of all drivers tested in the under 25 years old age group provided a positive breath test compared with 7.1% aged 25-44 years, 3.2% aged 45-64 and 7.5% aged over 65 years.

Furthermore, 489 of the total breath tests were conducted following a road traffic collision, of which 26 gave a positive reading, equating to 5.3%.

Chief Inspector Mike Bacon of the Roads Policing Unit says: "Obviously it is encouraging that the overall percentage of those drink driving has reduced, however these statistics are still too high and there is no room for complacency.

"Those offending need to realise the implications of what they are doing, not just for their own sake but for the sake of the other innocent road users they are putting at risk.

"We are determined to continue to clamp down on those who drink drive and will take action against anyone committing an offence. The message is simple - if you drink, don't drive."

Anyone who suspects someone of drink-driving is asked to report them immediately to the police or Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

SUFFOLK POLICE'S TOP TIPS FOR WINTER DRIVING

During wintry weather conditions:

- Ask yourself is your journey essential?
- Check the local and national weather forecasts.
- Listen to local and national radio for travel information.
- Tell someone at your destination what time you expect to arrive.
- Adjust your driving to the conditions, as hail, heavy snow and rain reduce visibility.
- Use dipped headlights and reduce your speed.
- Dazzle from winter sun can be dangerous. Keep a pair of sunglasses handy and slow down.
- Make sure you are equipped with warm clothes, food, boots and a torch. In snowy conditions take a spade.
- Clear your windows and mirrors before you set out and carry a screen scraper and de-icer.

During these cold times it is so important that we try and look out for and help any vulnerable people:

- If you have any concerns at all about an elderly or vulnerable person living nearby, please knock on the door and check they are OK.
- Please check to see if older people can get to the shops and have what they need in the house.
- Encourage people to use their heating, drop in some essential supplies or extra blankets. If you can, make sure driveways and steps are ice free.

- · wear a white tabard over a smart suit.
